Who is a veteran?

In the context of ANVAM's mission a veteran is a person who has served at least one day in the Australian Military and Australian Defence Forces. This includes current and exserving members regardless of rank, age, service or operational experience.

Who is a veteran artist?

A veteran artist is a veteran or veterans family member who engages in the Arts.

Chairmans Report

The team at ANVAM and its growing band of supporters have achieved far more in 2017 than was anticipated at this time in 2016, for which I am very proud.

Confidence was low at the end of 2016 in ANVAM accessing 310 St Kilda Rd (310SKR). A chance meeting with Senator Derryn Hinch early in 2017 put 310SKR back on track with his advocacy to the Federal Government. As a result, significant progress has been made toward ANVAM's goal for 310SKR. Aspirations toward having a more positive outcome in time for the 80th anniversary of 310SKR in November 2017 will not be met as negotiations between the Federal and Victorian State Governments are ongoing. The support for the goal of preserving the former Repatriation Commission Outpatient Clinic has grown with an online petition attracting over 13,500 signatures in the first half of 2017

ANVAM's focus during the first half of 2017 on its inaugural exhibition and launch proved to be a great success. The launch of ANVAM attracted a very positive response with many supporters attending the event. ANVAM was launched by Patron, Lieutenant General Ash Power AO CSC (Rtd). Most of the artists participating in the exhibition were in attendance capping off an emotional evening.

The *A March to Art: Identity* exhibition concluded on ANZAC Day. Attention then turned to engaging with ex-service organisations in order to establish further collaborations and partnerships for workshops and programs.

Another key focus was ANVAM's Arts programs. We've been very pleased to have worked with many RSLs, Legacy, Soldier On and Defence, setting a strong foundation to develop further positive relationships in 2018.

To all who have supported ANVAM in 2017, thank you. We look forward to a productive and creative 2018.

Board

ANVAM continues to be well supported by a dedicated Board of Directors. During the 2016 Annual General Meeting (AGM), in accordance with ANVAM's Constitution, two members of the Board retired, Chairman Mark Johnston and Treasurer Dominik Kul. Both put themselves forward for re-appointment and were accepted by the Board. Mark was re-appointed as Chairman.

This year saw a reduced number of Board meetings largely due to interstate work commitments of the Executive. Despite this reduced tempo the ANVAM Board has overseen ANVAM's steady progress and commitments including exhibitions and arts programs.

As the year comes to an end consideration of the Board membership was undertaken prior to the AGM. Candidates for ANVAM's Board were identified to address gaps in the Board's composition, and endorsed by the ANVAM members during the 2017 AGM. The Board would like to thank Professor Su Baker for her contribution and support to ANVAM as a founding Board member.

The Board's key goals include the stabilisation of the ANVAM business model and development of a strategy to take the charity forward. The business model relies on the establishment of strong relationships with the ex-service community, Department of Veterans Affairs and Department of Defence. Within ANVAM's immediate footprint of Melbourne and Victoria, relationships are already well formed. Early efforts to reach out to regional Victoria are also providing confidence in the value of ANVAM's Arts based model to the needs of veterans in these areas. Strong local relationships have been established with Legacy, Bravery Trust, Carry On (Vic), Soldier On, Epworth Geelong and the RSL.

There are a number of key threads to ANVAM's strategy, which include development of a sustainable approach to service delivery, building upon ANVAM's strong and collaborative reputation within the ex-service community, seeking and facilitating opportunities for veterans in the Arts, and continuing to pursue and implement 310 St Kilda Rd as the permanent home of veterans Arts in Australia.

Launch

ANVAM Core Business

Programs

Over the past twelve months ANVAM has engaged with a range of organisations in the conduct of Arts engagement programs. These programs are centred around ANVAM's strong belief that veterans wellbeing is best served by creating strong communities where veterans live and work. The organisations ANVAM has worked with are as follows:

Defence Land Systems Division (LSD)

The Land Engineering Agency (LEA) of Land Systems Division engaged ANVAM to undertake a wellbeing program during its Wellbeing Day. This program was attended by twelve members of LEA with the workshop facilitated by two of ANVAM's facilitators and Artist Mentor, Gordon Traill.

Soldier On

ANVAM launched its new program Tools of the Trade with Soldier On in August. The Tools of the Trade uses printmaking as an accessible medium for all artistic levels. The Soldier On workshop was conducted over a six-week period with the focus on supporting veterans in the development of their personal confidence and to build relationships.

Legacy

A family focussed pilot program was conducted with Legacy over a six-week period in July – August. The feedback from the families involved was very positive, with Legacy committing to continue the program for families through 2018 and introduce a second program for adults with disability.

ANVAM's full creative Arts engagement capability has been embraced by Legacy with the acknowledgement that the issues faced by veterans and their families often require more than an activities focus to address individual's needs. Legacy recognises the professional support and engagement of art therapists.

Legacy Melbourne includes ANVAM as one of its strategic partners.

Epping RSL

Ongoing support to the Epping RSL Poppy group has continued to progress from strength to strength under the leadership of Dot Thomas and Joyce Butler with the regular support of ANVAM's Arts facilitators, Tanja Johnston and Erica Mainprize.

VetRAP-17

The Veterans Regional Arts Program (VetRAP-17) was launched at Midlands-Ballarat RSL in November. VetRAP was funded by a grant from the Victorian ANZAC Day proceeds funds to conduct two veterans welfare Arts programs. ANVAM chose to focus efforts on regional Victoria where there has been little access for veterans to facilitated Arts programs.

VetRAP-17 incorporated the Tools of the Trade printmaking into the two-day workshop program. The program was designed to introduce creative programs into regional Victoria to support veterans wellbeing and welfare.

The participants in the program provided enthusiastic and positive feedback on the benefits of Arts engagement.

The second of two funded programs will be conducted in Geelong in December 2017.

Exhibitions

A March to Art: Identity

ANVAM's inaugural exhibition featured 18 veteran artists from across Australia with a wide range of mediums; poetry, stop motion animation, stencil art, textiles, photography, painting, sculpture, ceramics and music.

The exhibition was well attended by over 1,000 visitors in the six weeks leading up to ANZAC Day. Included amongst those visitors were Senator Jane Hume and Senator Derryn Hinch. Both were moved by the experience and stories associated with the art works. Senator Hinch asked two veteran artists if he could hang their works in his parliamentary office in Canberra, where those works remain.

Coming Home - Veterans Arts and Photography Exhibition

ANVAM Arts Mentor, Gordon Traill, has been working with ANVAM's Head of Arts Programs, Tanja Johnston, to hold an exhibition of veterans art and photography in partnership with Unitingcare Armadale. This exhibition will open on 17 November 2017 and features the work of 19 veteran artists. ANVAM will contribute works by veteran artists from the ANVAM permanent collection. ANVAM also sought expressions of interest from veteran artists through ANVAM's mentoring program. A number of works were made specifically for the exhibition.

310 St Kilda Rd

A focal point for ANVAM is the transformation of the former Repatriation Commission Outpatient Clinic at 310 St Kilda Rd (310SKR), Southbank, into a modern world class cultural and Arts in health institution.

As 2016 drew to a close the level of confidence in achieving this objective was fading as the clear message from the Federal Government was that 310SKR would be sold.

In early 2017, a meeting with Senator Derryn Hinch drew his immediate enthusiasm to support ANVAM's efforts to return 310SKR to the veteran community. This support was quickly rewarded with Senator Hinch taking the case to the Prime Minister, the Hon Malcolm Turnbull MP. With the Prime Minister's support, momentum at the Federal level was quickly established. The Government's approach to date is to seek agreement from the Victorian State Government for a transfer of the property to the State. Consideration of the proposal by the State is pending.

As part of Defence's disposal process, a nomination for heritage listing in Victoria was assessed by Heritage Victoria. A thoroughly researched report resulted with a strong recommendation to include 310SKR on Victoria's Heritage Register. Consideration by the Heritage Council will occur in the event a decision is made to transfer the property to the State of Victoria.

Significantly, the 15th of November 2017 was the 80th anniversary of the opening of the former Repatriation Clinic.

RMIT

A collaboration between ANVAM and RMIT Interior Design Department resulted in the 2nd and 3rd year students undertaking a design study of 310SKR. All contributed a great deal of work with the results being presented to the ANVAM Executive on 22 October.

This collaboration represents community engagements that ANVAM embraces as a positive way of improving the broader community's awareness of the veteran community, veterans Arts and 310SKR as an important heritage site.

Other Activities

Melbourne Military Officers Ball (MMOB)

For the second year ANVAM was invited to be involved in the MMOB. This year, with the generous donation of an art work by veteran artist Gordon Traill, the MMOB was able to raise \$1,100 for ANVAM. ANVAM's guests to the ball included ANVAM's Patron, Lieutenant General Ash Power, AO CSC (Rtd) and Mrs Narelle Power. Brigadier Ed Smeaton also attended as an ANVAM guest.

The ongoing support of the MMOB committee is gratefully acknowledged, in particular Lieutenant Colonel Paul Nathan CSM in this his tenth year as Chairman of the MMOB.

Parliament House

Collection

Upon invitation by the Australian Parliament House, ANVAM submitted nine veteran artists for acquisition consideration. Of the nine, four have been shortlisted for further consideration. The results of this acquisition process will be known in 2018.

Exhibition

ANVAM and the Australian Parliament House have reached an in-principle agreement for an exhibition commencing in November 2018. The exhibition will coincide with the end of the Centenary of WWI period.

The ANVAM Collection

Throughout 2017 ANVAM has established the foundations for its collection. It was widely considered important to retain as many of the works from ANVAM's inaugural exhibition, *A March to Art: Identity*. It was during the exhibition that an offer of another body of work was made by the family of Andrew Guthrie, a RAAF WWII veteran. A donation of the Andrew Guthrie Collection was subsequently made to ANVAM and was immediately provided to the Grimwade Centre of the University of Melbourne for conservation assessment and work.

Visit by United States Second Lady, Karen Pence


